An opportunity to reimagine leadership

Since 1998, the Belfast/Good Friday Agreement has provided a template for political progress in Northern Ireland. Yet, governance arrangements in Northern Ireland continue to be fragile and the legacy of the Troubles remains divisive. Globalisation, the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the UK's exit from the EU, and the cost-of-living crisis have simultaneously introduced additional complexities that require non-traditional skills for political, business, and civic leaders to navigate.

Leaders are being scrutinised more than ever as their character and competency are consistently called into question from various corners of society. According to research from Jon Stokes and Sue Dopson at the Saïd Business School, University of Oxford, trust in leadership is at an all-time low and leaders must prove themselves to gain respect. The complex decision-making skills that leaders need to prevent higher levels of distrust, fear, and conflict, are more critical than ever.

Since 2021, the Fellowship Programme has provided the opportunity to reimagine complex political, business, and civic leadership in Northern Ireland through innovation and capacity building to address the challenges of today for the prosperity of tomorrow.









The Fellowship Programme

There has never been a more critical time for leadership that focuses on the collective and does not withhold knowledge, instead choosing to empower communities and sectors by encouraging information sharing.

The Fellowship Programme is an independent and non-partisan executive programme for twenty-four ambitious leaders from across the political spectrum, business, and civic society in Northern Ireland. It seeks to support the peace process, foster innovation and capacity building, and encourage collaborative decision-making so that leaders across society are strengthened and equipped to navigate through complexity and deliver real change for the benefit of all.

The Fellowship Programme is delivered by the Centre for Democracy and Peace Building (CDPB), working with key stakeholders, policy makers and facilitators from leading academic institutions, including the University of Oxford, with support from its advisory board.

The Oxford experience

Participants will have the opportunity to immerse themselves in the history of Oxford, the oldest university in the English-speaking world. Here in the 'city of dreaming spires', Fellows will enter an oasis of learning, where the world's greatest leaders and thinkers have studied for over nine hundred years and where research breakthroughs continue to be made today.





The Dublin experience

In Dublin, the UNESCO City of Literature, home to many acclaimed literary pioneers, participants will have the opportunity to work with pioneers in their own fields of politics and business as well as policy development, international relations, and diplomacy. The residential will be developed in partnership with the Royal Irish Academy and colleagues from the Department of Foreign Affairs.







The Good Friday Agreement Online Course

As part of the Fellowship Programme, Fellows will receive free access to CDPB's Good Friday Agreement Online Course (RRP £199). The interactive course, which is CPD certified (16 hours), introduces you to the Belfast/Good Friday Agreement: its historical context; the negotiation process from which it emerged; its architecture and content; and the analysis of its implementation.

Design Thinking

Throughout the programme, Fellows will undertake a Design Thinking project. During the Oxford residential, Fellows will spend a day learning about Design Thinking from industry experts, where they will be divided into groups (based on a diversity of sectors) to identify a societal challenge and then seek to begin to address that challenge.

Hence, the Design Thinking project harnesses the eco-leadership framework underpinning the Fellowship Programme. This activity will have dedicated time during various programme sessions including the Dublin residential, and Fellows will also work in their groups outside of the programme.











Design Thinking in action

Nuala Toman, Head of Policy, Communications, Information, and Advocacy at Disability Action, Class of 2023

The persistent cost-of-living emergency, political impasse, and public finance crisis were the backdrop to my group's work. Together as a group of cross-sectoral leaders, we considered how the current societal context would impact upon disabled people and disabled person's organisations. The process identified that while funding and investment were important, disabled people wanted credible employment opportunities and ways to develop entrepreneurship. From this the seeds of the Empower programme were planted. Empower is a £4.6mn programme funded by the UK government and will support two thousand disabled, autistic, and/or neurodivergent people to secure careers across all sectors and all levels of careers.



Net Zero Neighbourhood Design Competition

Ciarán Fox, Director of the Royal Society of Ulster Architects and Chair of Climate NI, Class of 2024

The Design Thinking project has allowed me to collaborate with other Fellows on how to deliver tangible benefits of climate action in a deprived community in Belfast. In my dayjob as Director of the Royal Society of Ulster Architects, I had been developing a net-zero neighbourhood ideas competition for early career architects. As a result of the collaboration with other Fellows, this competition in now due to be substantially enhanced. For example, on the advice of Fellow Róisín Wood, Chief Executive of the Community Foundation for Northern Ireland (CFNI), I am currently applying for a CFNI grant. If successful, this would enable us to present the best three ideas from the competition to the local community for a public vote. The funding, if successful, will also give the winning design team the opportunity to engage in more detail with the community to develop a costed proposal for action that would reduce household bills, improve health, and reduce emissions.



Alumni network

Entering its fourth year, the Fellowship Programme's alumni network comprises over seventy leaders from across various sectors in Northern Ireland. In the realm of politics, alumni include one MP, nine MLAs, and seven local councillors. Of those MLAs, one is a minister in the NI Executive (Finance), two are committee chairs, and four are deputy committee chairs. The network contains several senior civil servants including Comptroller and Auditor General, Chief of Staff of the NI Fiscal Council, and Principal Officer in the Department of Health. Moreover, there are several senior members of businesses and charities (including CEOs) who make up the alumni network.

Fellows of the 2024/25 cohort will join this extensive and unique network and have countless opportunities to engage and develop relationships as well as attend alumni-only seminar and events.

The Fellowship Programme is designed for leaders from political, business, public sector and civic society backgrounds working in Northern Ireland.

To apply, please complete the application form at fellowship.democracyandpeace.org by **19 June 2024**. You will be asked to upload your CV and two short essays.

Please submit an up-to-date resumé or CV (maximum 2 pages A4 PDF). You will also be required to submit two essays in PDF format (up to 250 words each excluding footnotes). The two questions are the following:

Please describe what you believe is the most strategic challenge facing Northern Ireland in the next decade?

By outlining both your immediate and long term career goals, how will the Fellowship Programme help you achieve those goals?

Fees

The programme registration fee is £1500. This includes accommodation in Oxford and Dublin, meals during the residentials, programme materials, and access to the Good Friday Agreement Online Course.

You will need to cover the cost of travel to/from Oxford and Dublin.
